

Advent, a season of preparation

The four week cycle of Advent began on Sunday, November 29, and it is considered the start of the liturgical New Year. We'll be focusing on passages pointing to the promise of Christ's birth and preparing our

hearts to welcome the Christ child once again.

- + Meditation guides for home use are available for adults/families on our welcome table. The glad sounds of beautiful music heralding the coming of Christ have long been a hallmark of the Advent and Christmas season. In this collection of Advent meditations called Hark the Glad Sounds, expert church musician Dr. Barry Bobb explores the history and meaning behind twelve familiar carols. Verse after verse, let the message of these wondrous melodies of our salvation in Christ put a joyous song in your heart each day of Advent. Youth Advent calendars will also be available.

Pastor's message...

The Christmas rush isn't all bad

"Silent night, holy night, all is calm, all is bright," so the song goes. Unfortunately, our Advent and Christmas can seem anything but calm. As I write this, it is mid-November, and yet, our congregation's planning teams have already been working on our Christmas together for weeks. Christmas music has started to play in stores and in some cases on the radio. One of my neighbors has already set up their Christmas tree even though Advent doesn't begin for almost two weeks!

Our society seems impatient to experience Christmas joy and peace. Perhaps this is because there is too little joy and peace in our world. At this time of year, it gets busier at our congregation and busier in our homes. Light dims and darkness grows. Unexpected bills happen. Sickness and death comes. After Paris, Beirut, Kenya, and on and on, terrorism and war frighten us. We hope for an ideal Christmas because our lives in a fallen world are always less than perfect. Too little is calm, and our future may seem dark to us. We often hunger for a reprieve from our pain and busy, unpredictable life.

COME, LORD JESUS, QUICKLY COME.

Jesus came into a time of trouble not so unlike our own. People were lucky to reach their teens. Thirty was considered old. Israel was an occupied country with isolated rebels and thieves (especially in Judea) seeking to defeat the Roman Empire and perhaps get a little economic advantage and power for themselves at the same time. For their part, the Romans wished to assert their power at all costs. Their vassal king, Herod the Great, was known to be tyrannical if not a bit mentally unstable. It would be he who ordered all babies and

toddlers in Bethlehem murdered over fear that the recently born Jesus would usurp his throne. Life was hard and often unfair. Despite these threats, Jesus came as a most vulnerable babe. He was a child of scandal, for his neighbors had heard of Mary's pregnancy prior to her marriage with Joseph. Many in that day were poor like Jesus' own family, and they often lived and died by the discretion and generosity of others with higher stature. Jesus didn't come into the world to avoid our pain. Instead, he embraced and crushed it forever. As one liturgical communion prayer reminds us, "Dying you destroyed our death, rising you restored our life. Lord Jesus, come in glory."

Most certainly, we can be encouraged that Jesus shared in our weakness and sorrows in order to share with us his victory over sin, suffering, death and the Devil. Against all odds, peace forcefully broke into our world to live among us and die among us through Jesus. For a moment, all was calm and all was bright because God was finally with us in the flesh. It was time for all creation to pause, worship and give thanks.


A mere 33 years later, all too soon, Jesus died, rose and ascended into heaven. We were warned life would not be easy in his absence, but it wouldn't remain hard for ever. Similar to our wait for Christmas morning, creation "waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God." It might prove a bumpy, fearful ride at times until then, but there can be joy on our journey. For Christmas day has come, and Easter is on its way. And all the while, we're not alone. We are the church together: enlivened by God's Spirit, sharing both our pain and joys with one another; offering pardon to those still in darkness. We are rushing not toward our death but toward a certain future filled with hope.

Christmas, the season celebrating Christ's birth

Christmas is a twelve-day liturgical celebration spanning from Christmas Eve, December 24th, through the Feast of the Epiphany (or Little Christmas), January 6th. Christmas commemorates the most momentous event in human history—the entry of God into the world He made, in the form of a baby. Epiphany traditionally marks the arrival of the Magi, or primarily in Eastern Christendom, the baptism of Jesus.

The story of Jesus turning water into wine at a family wedding can also be recalled. In each of these early stories, Jesus is shown to have the power of God. Other feast days of the season include St. Stephen's Day, a traditional day to feed and care for the poor (as in the carol, Good King Wenceslas), and the Massacre of the Holy Innocents (recalling Herod the Great's attempt to kill Jesus as an infant and the Holy Family's flight into Egypt. Starting this season, the Narrative Lectionary will take us into the third of its four year cycle with a focus on the Gospel of Mark.



On Christmas Eve, we'll have one service at 7:00 pm.
Building off of our Advent meditations, the rich meaning behind the beloved hymn "Silent Night" will be captured throughout this special candlelight service.

On Epiphany, Wednesday, January 6th, at 6:00 pm, help us welcome the arrival of the traditional Three Wisemen. They will bare gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh for our newborn king.

You are invited to bring socks, gloves, and winter hats for area people in need. In addition, we'll have our annual bonfire of Christmas greens and fellowship. Members of Friends of L'Arche Central Virginia, a community serving those with intellectual disabilities, will be joining us. We'll have an Epiphany cake and door prizes. Have left over Christmas goodies? Bring them along to share. This short evening event is perfect for children of all ages!



Volunteer Opportunities from Social Ministry

Volunteer-Leader-In-Training – Hanover County Parks and Recreation

The Leader-in-Training (LIT) program is designed for students who are interested in volunteering their time and energy to share their passion for working with children while gaining valuable experience. LITs assist summer staff with the overall operation of Summer Sneakers and/or Discover Camps (day camps for elementary age children) including program planning, activity leading, serving as a positive role model for children and more. Eligibility: Applicants must be a rising 9th grader (or higher) for the upcoming 2016-2017 school year and be under the age of 18 as of June 20, 2016. A competitive selection process (including application, interview) will be used to fill the limited number of LIT positions. Chosen applicants may be scheduled to volunteer for 1, 2, 3 or more sessions. Due to the high number of applicants and limited openings, not all applicants will be offered positions. Application deadline: April 10, 2016. For more information, call 804-365-4300.

Love horses? Volunteer with a local nonprofit horse rescue organization – Virginia Equine Welfare Society located in Ashland, VA

Horse Care - Hands on horse care, mucking stalls, feeding, grooming, first aid, property maintenance, etc.; Information Booth - Help with educational programs presented by VEWS; Help at information booths by assisting in setting up the booth and speaking to the public about horse neglect/abuse and inform the public about VEWS and our mission. Fundraising - Help organize and work fundraising events like formal fundraising events, information/merchandise booths,

sell raffle or event tickets, concessions, sales and other special events. Transporter - Move horses where needed. Must have own truck and trailer. Narrative Lectionary – Gospel of Mark

The Narrative lectionary is an alternative four-year cycle of readings. On the Sundays from September through May each year, the texts follow the sweep of the biblical story from Creation through the early Christian church. The texts show the breadth and variety of voices within Scripture. They invite people to hear the stories of Abraham and Sarah, Moses and the prophets, Jesus, and Paul. Listening to the many different voices within Scripture enriches preaching and the life of faith. In December, we enter the Gospel of Mark, the shortest and thought to be the earliest gospel. As you listen, be prepared to encounter sparse history with no account of Christ's early years and some of his most popular teachings. The writing style is relatively unrefined and fast paced. Jesus' humanity and deeds are lifted up more than his words or identity as the Son of God. Jesus' time in Galilee seems to be of special interest along with the many failures of his followers to understand and believe in Jesus. The text ends abruptly at the empty tomb. "So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid" (16:8). Will the hearer stand on their belief or not?
